

# Tuberculosis in WA 2023

In 2023, there were 161 TB cases notified in Western Australia at the rate of 5.6 cases per 100,000 population. This represented a 61% increase from the numbers notified in 2022.







## WESTERN AUSTRALIA TUBERCULOSIS CONTROL PROGRAM

The WA TB Control Program (WATBCP) is a state wide specialised public health service that provides outpatient services for the treatment, surveillance and prevention of Tuberculosis (TB). The clinic, located at the Anita Clayton Centre provides treatment and management of active TB and Latent TB patients with a dedicated adult and paediatric clinic. Management of TB is via a nurse led case management approach for all patients.
